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Good Clinical Practice (GCP) is an international quality standard that is provided by International Conference on Harmonisation (ICH), an international body that defines standards, which governments can transpose into regulations for clinical trials involving human subjects.

Good Clinical Practice guidelines include protection of human rights as a subject in clinical trial. It also provides assurance of the safety and efficacy of the newly developed compounds.

Good Clinical Practice Guidelines include standards on how clinical trials should be conducted, define the roles and responsibilities of clinical trial sponsors, clinical research investigators, and monitors. In the pharmaceutical industry monitors are often called Clinical Research Associates.

Life The son of Robert Robinson of Mayfield, Herefordshire, he was born in that county. He entered St. John's College, Oxford, in 1620, and was elected to a fellowship in 1622, but never held it. His first preferment was the prebend of Ketton in York Cathedral, granted in 1623; he was also made dean of Dunchurch in 1628, and at the same time chaplain in ordinary to Prince Charles. In 1630 he was nominated to the rectory of Heavitree in Devon, which he held till 1652. To the parliament of England Robinson was one of the representatives of Devon, where he gave much assistance to the Tories. He afterwards, during the parliaments of Charles I and Charles II, was elected knight of the shire for Devon in 1640, and was appointed one of the privy counsellors and joint treasurer of the navy in 1640. At the Restoration he was removed from the treasurership, but he was admitted to the council of state in 1660. In 1661 he was elected member for Tiverton in the Convention Parliament. On 21 October 1661 he was appointed guardian to the young Prince of Wales. His family had been connected with the court for several generations. His wife, Edith, was the daughter of Robert Shirley, an ancestor of the Earls of Aldborough; his first cousin Sir Robert Robinson, the founder of the baronetcy of Redcastle in the county of Devon, was grandfather of the viscounts of Carrington and Somerset. When war broke out in 1662 Robinson left England, going to Rome, where he was made an archpriest of the college of St. Peter's; but the Elector of Bavaria had the pension of £100 a year which he received confirmed. In 1664 he returned to England, and in the same year was presented to the rectory of Daventree, Devon, which he held till his death. He was appointed, in November 1663, one of the coronation commissioners, and in May 1664 he went to London, being empowered to negotiate a peace with the republic. He returned to Devon in October, and died at Daventree on 13 May 1663 82157476af

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
